The Chesapeake Bay Trust Announces Grant Awards

In February 2020, the Chesapeake Bay Trust approved 37 awards totaling \$2,608,224 to enable a wide range of organizations to implement on-theground restoration and education projects and programs.

Four times each year, after a rigorous technical review process, the Trust's Board of Trustees announce their award approvals. These awards support watershed-wide non-profit organizations, schools,

community groups, local governments, and municipalities through a variety of innovative outreach, restoration techniques. See the February 2020 awarded projects here.

Chesapeake Bay Trust Introduces Its 2020-2025 Strategic Plan

The Trust examined critical issues, considered our strengths and values, and identified several ways we can use our unique skills to advance progress towards our vision. The Trust believes we can deploy our resources in ways that engage a greater proportion of our region's residents, that identify co-benefits across community and environmental goals, that take into account changing climate and



conditions, and as a result spark acceleration of and cost-effectiveness in watershed health improvements and protections.

The Trust translates its five-year strategic plan into annual work plans that articulate clear annual goals and is aligned with the annual budget process. Each annual Trust work plan will, in turn, be divided into department goals, individual staff work programs, and a board work program divided into board committee responsibilities. For a Healthy Bay, Let Grasses Stay

Are you one of the 260,000 recreational boaters chomping at the bit to get on the Chesapeake Bay this year? It is purported that everyone in the Chesapeake Bay watershed is six degrees away from a boat owning friend with the promise of sunset sails, crab house cruises, and weekend raft-ups.

But there's an economy behind the recreation as well; Maryland fisheries and watermen all rely on strong fish populations that keep seafood healthy, economies strong, and ecotourism flourishing. At the Chesapeake Bay Trust's January Legislative Reception that kicked off the 2020 Maryland General Assembly, Senate President Bill Ferguson reminded the room that "the (Chesapeake) Bay is the most important

thing we have in the state of Maryland. It is the commerce hub and is where we have the birth of our future experiences." This all takes a toll on the ecosystems that support the health and wildlife of the Bay. Read more about how the Trust is helping to maintain harmony through grant-making here.

Wellness Ambassadors of Harvest Time Ministries Take Action

End Time Harvest ministries (ETHM), located in Bladensburg, is a faith-based organization that has made it part of its mission to empower youth to become



leaders in their neighborhoods. One way that ETHM fulfills its goal is through the Wellness Ambassadors Program, which allows youth to participate in a variety of activities that ultimately promote health and wellness.

ETHM carried out a Wellness Ambassadors Environmental Health Summer Employment Program, aimed at connecting stormwater management to health. This program allowed students and families from Port Towns, Kenilworth, and Riverdale neighborhoods to participate in tree planting activities and workshops on the importance and benefits of trees. A total of 15 native trees were planted, and the environmental literacy of the participants was boosted as they took part in this hands-on project. 
