Prince George's County Pet Waste Initiative

Funded by the Prince George's
Stormwater Stewardship Grant Program,
the Sustainable Maryland program at
University of Maryland's Environmental
Finance Center (EFC) partnered with
Prince George's County Department of
Environment (DoE) to help launch the

new County Pet Waste Management initiative, Scoop That Poop. During the first phase, Sustainable Maryland partnered with Bladensburg, Brentwood, Cottage City, Edmonston, District Heights, and Landover Hills, meeting with their Green Teams, town managers, elected officials, and residents to identify locations for new pet waste stations. Phase 2 of the Pet Waste Initiative began in early 2018. Sustainable Maryland staff will be working with Berwyn Heights, Capitol Heights, Colmar Manor, Forest Heights, Hyattsville, and Seat Pleasant, in addition to several neighborhood associations.

GRANTEE NEWS

- First Beach Cleanup Sees Record Volunteer Turnout: 112 volunteers showed up to clean up trash at Terrapin Park for Kent Island Beach Cleanups' first trash pickup of the year. Through a Chesapeake Bay Trust Community Engagement mini grant, some of the trash collected from this event and the other pickups scheduled for the summer will be used to create a recycled sculpture that educates the public on the impact of trash on local waterways. - Greening at Mount Royal: Students at the Mount Royal School in Baltimore
 will be learning about the importance of pollinators and native plants while
 they assist in building a pollinator garden and outdoor classroom this spring,
 funded in part by the Chesapeake Bay Trust. Once this project is completed,
 the space will be used by students and teachers, as well as open to members
 of the community. If you are interested, there are two volunteer days
 scheduled for May, which you can learn more about here.
- Manchester Valley—a Maryland Green Ribbon School—Uses Teamwork to Create Native Garden, Help Health of Bay: Students at Manchester Valley High School in Carroll County are creating a native garden to manage stormwater runoff on their school property through an Environmental Education Mini Grant from the Chesapeake Bay Trust. Manchester Valley is already a certified Green School, and now they are one of two Maryland schools who were certified as a Maryland Green Ribbon School this year. You can find out more about this project, as well as the other work that Manchester Valley is doing to become a nationally ranked Green Ribbon School, here.
- Most Watershed Residents Unaware of Their Role in Pollution: Only 35 percent of watershed residents think that their own actions affect their local water quality and the health of the Chesapeake Bay, yet 85 percent think that people working together is a potential solution to improve local water quality. This disjunction and others were revealed from the results of a survey the Chesapeake Bay Program conducted last year to measure the level of citizen engagement in watershed issues. The results of the survey indicated a score of 24 out of 100 for Citizen Stewardship. This survey can now be used to

identify where gaps are in education and restoration, as well as better engage underserved or under-engaged audiences. To find out more about the results and implications of this survey, click <a href="https://example.com/here.c

- Growing and Knowing: OCHS Science Students, Staff Construct Greenhouse, Native Plants Garden: Students at Orange County High School will be gaining some hands-on learning about sustainable agriculture, aquaculture, and water quality, through the construction of a greenhouse, aquaponics system, native garden, and outdoor classroom. This project, partially funded with a Chesapeake Bay Trust Environmental Education Mini Grant, has been the vision of biology and ecology teacher Anna Burkett for a long time, and will serve the school for years to come. - Blue Water Baltimore to Conduct Study for Herring Run Stormwater Project in Towson: Erosion and flash flooding have long plagued the Knollwood and Overbrook communities in Towson, but these might soon be issues of the past. Blue Water Baltimore was awarded a \$115,571 Watershed Assistance grant from the Chesapeake Bay Trust to study potential stormwater management practices that would mitigate these issues. This study will take a little over a year and then the results will inform what practices are constructed. You can find out more about this study here.


