Chesapeake Bay Trust Announces Grant Awards

In May 2020, the Chesapeake Bay Trust approved awards totaling more than \$4,637,200 from 10 grant programs to enable a wide range of organizations to implement on-the-ground restoration and education projects and programs.

Four times each year, after a rigorous technical review process, the Trust's Board of Trustees announce their award approvals. These awards support watershed-wide non-profit organizations, schools, community groups, local governments, and municipalities

Chesapeake Conservation Corps Profile: Emma O'Donnell & Carrie Murray Nature Center

Emma graduated last spring majoring in Environmental Studies and double minoring in Anthropology and Chesapeake Regional Studies. Wild Rice & The Changing Landscape of the Chesapeake Bay Watershed



Did you know that <u>wild rice</u> is more than just a side dish found at dinner time? Native to the Chesapeake Bay region, wild rice is an annual grass found in freshwater marshes that has been declining in reproduction due to an increase in of non-migratory waterfowl, invasive plants, and water pollution.

In 2015, <u>Prince George's County Public Schools Department of Curriculum and Instruction</u> began collaborating with the <u>William S. Schmidt Outdoor Education Center</u> to engage seventh-graders from 15 different schools in restoring the wild rice growing along the Patuxent River. Educators saw an opportunity to develop a <u>Meaningful Watershed Educational Experience</u> (MWEE) for understanding watershed water quality issues and the decline of native species. The Science is Clear: Boating is Good for Your Health and Mind. "Being able to go boating during the pandemic—or at any time, really—is great news, because studies also show that being on or near the water is a boon for psychological health. "Submerged aquatic vegetation (SAV) is combating acidification in the water, and not just in the areas where they grow, the study finds. 
