Now Open: Applications for 2019 Scholarship & Awards Program

The Chesapeake Bay Trust is now seeking applications and nominations for its 2019 Annual Scholarship and Awards Program. Launched in 1998, the Trust's Awards Program honors individuals and organizations for their work to promote environmental education, improve local communities, and help restore the natural resources of the Chesapeake Bay region.

The program includes two awards specifically for Trust grantees—one for an outstanding individual/leader and one for a standout project or program. There are also two student scholarships (\$5,000); an award for an outstanding environmental education teacher (\$2,500 grant); and an award celebrating local businesses that go above and beyond for the environment.

The deadline to submit an application or nomination is **October 15, 2018, at 4:00 pm**.

Prince George's County Stormwater Stewardship Grant Program: Greenbelt Homes, Inc.'s Rain Garden at 20 Court Ridge

Communities all across the Chesapeake Bay watershed face stormwater-related issues that range from poor drainage to flooding. The <u>Greenbelt Homes, Inc.</u> (GHI) community in Prince George's County, Maryland, is no exception. GHI is a housing cooperative comprising of 1,600 homes built in the 1930s and 1940s. In the last 70 years, the surrounding area's topography has significantly changed, with a dramatic increase in the amount of impervious surfaces created due to urban development.

In 2016, GHI applied for and received a grant award through the <u>Prince George's County Stormwater Stewardship Grant Program</u> to install a stormwater best management practice comprised of a <u>stone diaphragm</u>, <u>stone swale</u>, and <u>rain garden</u> at 20 Court Ridge Road.

Project Highlight: Borough of Chambersburg's Rhodes Drive Reconstruction and Bioretention Basin

Last week the Trust joined the Borough of Chambersburg, Pennsylvania, in celebrating the dedication of their Rhodes Drive Reconstruction and Bioretention Basin project, which ensures that a critical emergency services route is safe AND that polluted stormwater runoff is diverted and treated before running into a nearby trout stream.

Funding from the <u>Green Streets, Green Jobs, Green Towns Grant Program</u>, a partnership between the Trust, U.S. EPA Mid-Atlantic Region, City of Baltimore Office of Sustainability, with support from the Maryland Department of Natural Resources,

enabled the Borough to enhance an important gray infrastructure project with a bioretention basin, a stormwater best management practice (BMP) designed to catch and treat the first flush of polluted stormwater, running the full length of the street.

- Rock Hall Yacht Club Sailing School Wetlands Enhancemet: RHYC Sailing School is a nonprofit educational public charity with a mission to instill a love of sailing and the water in children and adults by teaching sailing in a structured, safe, and fun environment. Because their mission is interdependent on the conservation and preservation of the Chesapeake, this year they took on their first wetland enhancement project on the Club's campus, removing phragmites, planting native plants, and developing a curriculum to educate local students.
