

Maintaining and enhancing its community areas is one of the primary responsibilities of the Edgewater Beach Citizens Association for the Edgewater Beach Shaded section community. The community is a small neighborhood of 53 homes. In the communal area of several acres, a park, picnic area, and an active pier with boat slips are the

This project was funded through the Trust's <u>Community Engagement Mini-Grant program</u> which is designed to connect residents throughout Maryland in activities that enhance communities, engage residents, and improve natural resources. Chesapeake Conservation Corps Member, Amanda Bland and the Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay

Amanda was placed at the Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay (The Alliance) for her year-long term of service in August. The Alliance works to implement unique strategies to enable humans, waterways, and land to prosper. Amanda is "ecstatic and

grateful to be working with an organization whose values align so closely with her own," and has already gained an entirely new understanding and appreciation of restoration projects around the region. On her first day at the Alliance, Amanda was able to visit a potential spotted turtle restoration site. Amanda has been hard at work planning a habitat forum in Southern Maryland, leading outreach for the Chesapeake Watershed Forum, and producing new content for the Alliance Blog. Amanda says her experience so far has allowed her to explore many different aspects of the environmental field and has increased her motivation. Frederick Food Security Network Expands Upon 2018 Success

The Frederick Food Security
Network (FFSN) is a
collaborative community effort
formed by the Hood College
Center for Coastal and
Watershed Studies to address
the needs of both stormwater
mitigation and food insecurity.



The network is a growing collective of urban farming operations from very small-scale garden sites to larger community garden operations built on currently unused lots. The network leverages community-based public-private partnerships to build and maintain a unique system of green stormwater mitigation, called vegetable rain gardens, which redirect rooftop runoff to use as subsurface

irrigation. Additionally, the project worked to improve the aesthetics of, and overall community benefit derived from unused space on partner grounds in Frederick City.

Since project funding in 2018, FFSN has established 5 community gardens, distributed food through six partner non-profit organizations, producing 1,500 pounds of produce with 200 volunteers reaching 400 families.

In 2019, FFSN goals include expanding their reach to 500 families, growing 2,500 pounds of produce, employing student workers, conducting community outreach events and cooking classes, and starting a campus food pantry.

Several grants provided funding for this effort including the Trust's <u>Green Streets</u>, <u>Green Jobs</u>, <u>Green Towns "G3" program</u>; a partnership with the United States Environmental Protection Agency, Region III and the Maryland Department of Natural Resources supporting local, grassroots-level greening efforts to reduce stormwater runoff. *Applications are currently being accepted for the G3 program*. *Read more about the program and apply here*.
