The Chesapeake Bay Trust Announces Awardees

In February 2020, the Chesapeake Bay Trust approved 37 awards totaling \$2,608,224 to enable a wide range of organizations to implement on-theground restoration and education projects and programs. Four times each year, the Trust's Board of Trustees announce their grant approvals

helping watershed-wide non-profit organizations, schools, community groups, local governments, and municipalities through a variety of outreach, restoration and innovative techniques. See the February 2020 awarded projects here.

Partnership Launches "Healthy Habitats Program"

Chesapeake Bay Trust grantee, <u>Urban Ecosystem</u>
<u>Restorations</u> (UER) collaborated with the Lakelands
Community Association of Gaithersburg to reduce
stormwater runoff, salt on icy sidewalks, and change
social norms around landscaping preferences. This
project was funded through the Trust's <u>Outreach and</u>
<u>Restoration Grant program</u>.

UER had a great 2019 launching its new "Healthy Habitats Program" to create and steward ecofunctioning spaces. Through the program, UER

delivers guidance and resources — by phone, email, and in-person consultations — to residents of Montgomery and Prince George's Counties in Maryland, and works with landowners interested in placing conservation easements on their Eco-Functioning Spaces to protect them over time. The program is designed to help landowners and property managers address a variety of land management concerns using Eco-Functioning Spaces and ecosystem services. Read the full blog post here. Wellness Ambassadors of End Time Harvest Ministries Take Action

ETHM was awarded a grant in 2017 to conduct a Wellness Ambassadors Environmental Health Summer Employment Program. This program



aimed to boost environmental literacy by connecting local stormwater management to the health and wellness of students and their families in the Port Towns, Kenilworth, and Riverdale neighborhoods. The Ambassadors participated in tree planting activities that were led by the Central Kenilworth Avenue Revitalization Community Development Corporation (CKAR CDC) and supported by the University of Maryland (UMD) and the Anacostia Watershed Society (AWS). A total of 15 native trees were planted at an Edmonston Road site, an area selected by CKAR CDC for revitalization. Students and their families also participated in a workshop held by AWS on the importance and benefits of trees in managing stormwater runoff.

This program was funded through the <u>Prince George's County Stormwater</u> <u>Stewardship Grant Program</u>. This program supports applicants seeking to carry out environmentally conscious projects focused on stormwater management and citizen engagement efforts. <u>City Nature Challenge</u> (CNC). Calling all nature lovers and wildlife enthusiasts in the Baltimore metro area! Please consider participating in the CNC - a friendly international science competition to see which metropolitan area can make the most observations of wildlife and identify the most species in their city. *The challenge starts Friday, April 24 and continues until Monday, April 27* in over 150 cities around the globe. Baltimore recorded 1,268 species during the 2019 challenge, earning 5th place for number of species identified among metro area regions similar in size. All

observations made and uploaded to the free <u>iNaturalist</u> app or website during the challenge in Baltimore City, Anne Arundel, Baltimore, Carroll, Harford, Howard and Queen Anne's counties count toward Baltimore's City Nature Challenge totals. 


