Watershed Stewards Academy Celebrates Earth Day by Installing Native Plants

The Berrywood community in Severna Park, Maryland was alarmed with the deteriorating water quality in Cattail Creek. It has been ranked year after year as having the worst water quality of any creek in the Magothy River Watershed according to Bob Royer, a Berrywood resident and volunteer water quality monitor for the Magothy River Association.

The Berrywood Community Association saw future development upstream as a

further threat to water quality and destruction of habitat for fish and wildlife such as Yellow Perch and the Great Blue Heron which make Berrywood their home.

Empowered by her new role as a Steward, in 2015 Molly LaChapelle, a long-time Berrywood resident, started looking for grant opportunities that could fund her restoration project. At a <u>Watershed Stewards Academy</u> event, she met a representative from <u>Maryland Department of Natural Resources</u> who said that their project would be a good fit for their funds. The <u>Chesapeake Bay Trust</u> with <u>Anne Arundel County Department of Public Works</u> and Maryland DNR provided the funds in 2016, and <u>Underwood & Associates</u> was awarded the design and construction of the stream restoration.

Construction of the site began in October of 2018 with a three-part approach. Read more about this amazing project <u>here</u>.

Restoration and Stormwater Management at Chesapeake College

ShoreRivers implemented a suite of 19 projects to address major stormwater challenges on campus and to capture runoff from almost 80 acres of surrounding agricultural fields. The projects include a wetland restoration and meadow planting, ten bioponds, two riparian



buffer plantings, a stream restoration, the conversion of 10 acres of turf to wildflower meadow, and a planting of four acres of switchgrass buffers around agricultural fields.

Collectively, these 19 projects will reduce bitrogen running into the Wye River by approximately 400 lbs. per year, phosphorus by 37 pounds per year, and sediments by almost 19 tons each year. The projects will also intersect with <u>education</u> <u>programs</u> at the college, provide opportunities for students to study the effects of the restoration work and to help maintain the new infrastructure, and will have high visibility as demonstration projects for all students and community members who use the campus.
