GRANTEE PROJECT SUCCESS STORIES



Riverbea Community Salutes Neighborhood: "May The Forest Be With You"

It is a problem faced by many homeowner associations: community common areas overtaken by invasive plant growth which seem to invade faster and cover more ground in a shorter amount of time than that spent maintaining our yards! This was the case for the <u>Riviera Beach Community</u> (RBC) subdivision in Pasadena, Maryland. The land is owned by RBC and this tight-knit community is governed by two different community associations; Riverbea and Riviera Community Improvement Association.

Valuable community public space had essentially become unusable because of overgrowth, neglect, drainage issues, and trash. With an award through the <u>Anne Arundel County Forestry and Forested Land Protection Program</u>, Riverbea was able to replace invasive foliage with native trees and plantings along the pathway to the shoreline, a semi-forested location within the watershed critical area. This project demonstrated the ability of neighbors to take an uncared-for lot and turn it into a

A Brighter Future for the Anacostia River

The <u>Anacostia Watershed Society</u> recently released the <u>2020 State of the Anacostia River Report</u>, which tells the story of the health of the Anacostia River from previously collected 2019 data. This report measures the overall health of the river by assigning a score and letter grade that takes into account several different water quality and remediation indicators. These indicators include dissolved oxygen, fecal bacteria, water clarity, chlorophyll a (measure of algae biomass), underwater grasses, stormwater runoff volume, amount of toxins and trash. Arundel Rivers releases the 2019 Report Card for South, West, and Rhode rivers. The report card scores are calculated with data from 22 tidal sites in the South River and 30 between the West and Rhode Rivers. Seven parameters are measured weekly (Apr.-Oct.) using water quality instruments. Read the full Arundel Rivers Federation report here.


Choosing Material Using the Native Plant Finder. When it comes to attracting beautiful butterflies and birds to your yard or community, the best thing you can do is use native plants. By planting natives, you restore the health and function of your local ecosystem. This website will help you find the best native plants specifically for your area that attract butterflies and moths and the birds that feed on their caterpillars, based on the scientific research of Dr. Douglas Tallamy. Stewards for Streams Expands to Queen Anne's County. Stewards for Streams is a partnership between two nonprofit organizations: ShoreRivers, which protects and restores Eastern Shore waterways; and Interfaith Partners for the Chesapeake, which has engaged over 300 congregations across Maryland in caring for local watersheds.
