




Through the <u>Prince George's County Stormwater Stewardship Grant Program</u>, the University of Maryland Environmental Finance Center was able to continue the Prince George's County Climate Wise Academy pilot program that will support three cohorts of 15 to 20 Climate Stewards each and foster an alumni network for continued peer learning.

This project is dedicated to ensuring that the success of the Prince George's County Climate Wise Academy pilot program extends beyond its initial implementation, fostering climate resilience in other communities and audiences through effective and adaptable strategies. This project will utilize several approaches identified during the Academy's Pilot phase to maintain and advance the County's Climate Stewards Academy program. This phase will allow for opportunities to replicate and adapt the Academy's strategies, insights, and successes in other communities facing similar climate challenges. EFC will host three cohorts of 15-20 Climate Stewards each and foster an alumni network for continued peer learning.

Riverdale Resident Receives a \$1,200 Rebate for Installing a Rain Garden at Their Residential Property



The <u>Rain Check Rebate Program</u> supports eight eligible practices, including rain gardens. Rain gardens are shallow, planted depressions full of water-tolerant

native plants that soak up stormwater. Rain gardens allow water to slowly seep into the ground, or infiltrate, which reduces the amount of water flowing across impervious surfaces.

Additionally, they slow the flow of polluted stormwater, keeping our waterways clean and safe, especially important in an era of climate change. With Sacred Grounds we partner with your congregation to both help you create a native plant pollinator garden on your grounds and educate and engage your members on planting native plants at home.

Maintenance Support Available for Rain Check Rebate Participants



Have you had a stormwater practice installed through the Prince George's County Rain Check Rebate Program? Introducing the Maintaining Stormwater Practices in the Anacostia Watershed program! This program is funded by the National Fish & Wildlife Foundation to help support residential property owners with maintenance of their Rain Check Rebate projects. This program offers support for Anacostia watershed residents through:

- Free Inspections: A landscape professional will evaluate your stormwater practice and provide a written report of maintenance recommendations
- <u>Discounted Maintenance</u>: For a limited time only, get up to 75% of the cost covered for the maintenance of your green feature while you learn proper maintenance techniques through hands-on preparation
- Stormwater Maintenance Resource Center: Check out the online maintenance resources for more information about caring for your stormwater practices
- Green Ambassadors Program (GAP): Are you interested in joining a community volunteer maintenance team to maintain neighborhood stormwater practices, including yours?


