



**Prince George's County Community Resilience Hub Grant Program**  
**Request for Proposals Frequently Asked Questions, Updated 2/20/2026**

1. Is the use of clean energy sources required?
  - a. This program prioritizes the use of clean energy sources whenever possible. If you are proposing to use fossil fuels as an energy source, we ask that you consider clean energy sources or explain why the use of cleaner energy sources is not possible.
2. Is a physical hub required?
  - a. Yes. A resilience hub must have a physical location and/or have the ability to be mobilized to provide services and relief leading up to, during, or after climate-related events.
3. Are resilience hub spaces required to provide shelter from extreme weather events (extreme heat, flooding, frigid temperatures, etc.)?
  - a. No, not all resilience hub spaces are required to provide shelter. However, all resilience hubs must be used in a way that builds community resilience. Examples include hosting programming and educational workshops on climate resilience, holding climate safety trainings, or deploying emergency equipment prior to a climate-related event.
4. Following the first round of the program, which closed on December 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2025, what is remaining balance of funds for FY26?
  - a. The remaining balance of funds in FY26 is ~\$85,000.
5. Could purchasing walkie-talkies for internal communications be an eligible expense within a larger emergency plan? Is a mobile AED an eligible expense.
  - a. Walkie-talkies and AEDs are not considered eligible expenses, as they fall under emergency response rather than climate resiliency. We acknowledge there are overlaps between climate resiliency and emergency response, and we encourage you to reach out to the program lead to discuss your project further.

6. Do projects, as pieces of a larger development plan, qualify for funding? Example: Building a community center that will function as a climate resilience hub.
  - a. This program does not fund land development projects. Additionally, the Trust cannot fund projects that are required under a permit or regulation. We encourage you to reach out to the Trust for projects that do not fall within these categories to further discuss.
