From the Chairman and Executive Director

Dear Friends of the Chesapeake Bay Trust,

We're very proud to report to you on the achievements of the Chesapeake Bay Trust over the last year. In 2008, the Trust awarded \$4 million in grants to over 421 organizations in every county in Maryland. Our grant programs helped to get over 87,000 students outdoors to learn about the Bay and to mobilize over 23,000 volunteers in projects that restored wetlands and shorelines, reduced polluted runoff from urban streets and agricultural fields, and enabled communities to plant trees and engage citizens in local clean-up efforts.

The Trust's grant programs deliver financial resources to local communities to help them create local solutions to environmental challenges and to develop community-based programs to educate and inspire leadership around natural resource conservation and protection. Funding for our grant programs comes from the sale of the Treasure the Chesapeake license plate and donations via the Bay and Endangered Species Fund on the Maryland State Tax Form. These programs demonstrate the power of small contributions to make substantial impacts on lives of Marylanders and the health of the Bay and its tributaries.

The Trust prides itself on the efficiency, accountability, and integrity of its grant-making. Fully 90% of our expenditures are directed to programmatic activities that benefit the environment. For the sixth consecutive year, we have received a "Four-Star Rating" from Charity Navigator, the nation's premier independent evaluator of non-profit organizations, placing us in the top 3% of charities nationwide. We are committed to honoring the public trust in and through our efforts to protect the Chesapeake Bay for the future.

We hope that this year's Annual Report provides a comprehensive and compelling look at the Trust and our efforts to support the inspiring activities of Marylanders who every day are teaching, volunteering, planting, and working for a healthier Bay watershed. And we thank you for your continued support.

What We Do

The Chesapeake Bay: one of the world's most productive and vital estuaries, home to numerous species from blue crabs to blue herons, a source of Maryland pride and recreation, and in need of our protection and help.

The Chesapeake Bay Trust is a nonprofit, grant-making organization chartered to promote public awareness of and participation in the restoration of the Chesapeake Bay watershed. Whether through a Bay education project for students or an innovative approach to reduce storm water run-off, the Trust seeks to help each and every Marylander find ways to improve the health of the Chesapeake Bay.

In 2008, 90 percent of the Trust's expenditures were directed to Chesapeake Bay restoration, education, innovation and outreach programs. We awarded over \$3.8 million dollars through 9 successful grant programs:























How We Do It

Citizens throughout Maryland who want to get their feet wet and their hands dirty can apply for a grant through our multiple grant programs online at www.chesapeakebaytrust.org. Maryland residents also have the opportunity to do their part by contributing directly to the Trust. The Trust ranks among the top 3% of U.S. charities as ranked by Charity Navigator, the nation's largest independent evaluator of charities.

Our funding comes from three sources:



Private and corporate contributions.



The sale of Treasure the Chesapeake license plates.



Donations from the Maryland state income tax check-off.

Restoration

The Chesapeake Bay Trust is committed to the restoration of the Chesapeake Bay. Through a variety of grant programs, we fund hundreds of non-profit organizations, schools, universities, local and state agencies, and other groups that are implementing projects that have measurable restoration impact on the environment and the Bay. Each grant program has specific guidelines, award amounts and requirements.

Funding for restoration based projects represented 31% of total Trust awards in 2008. Through 5 grant programs, we awarded \$1,170,381 to 65 organizations pursuing restoration projects throughout the Chesapeake Bay watershed.

Fisheries



In partnership with the Fish-America Foundation, this grant program enhances fisheries habitat through such activities as dam removals, riparian buffers, in-stream habitat, stream

bank stabilization, and other habitat-enhancing projects. The Trust accepts applications for this program once a year. Specific application requirements and details about the process can be found at our website www.chesapeakebaytrust.org. Our grant managers work closely with all applicants to answer questions and clarify requirements. The Trust funded four projects in 2008 with awards totaling \$50,284, matched by the FishAmerica Foundation.


Living Shorelines

This program promotes the use of natural habitat elements to protect shorelines from erosion, in place of hard shoreline armor that offers less habitat and water quality value. In



2008, the Trust and our partners; National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association's Restoration Center, the Keith Campbell Foundation for the Environment (KCF), and the National Fish and Wildlife Founda-

tion, funded 10 projects totaling over \$500,000 toward which the Trust and the KCF applied \$385,640. These projects will result in the installation or design of over one mile of living shoreline, engaging hundreds of volunteers and over 1600 hours of volunteer time and leveraging over \$1.8 million in matching contributions.

Mini Grant (Restoration)



The Mini Grant Program is our most popular program. Mini Grants provide funding of up to \$5,000 for school-based environmental education projects, on-the-ground restora-

tion projects on school or community grounds, or efforts to increase public engagement and understanding of the Bay and its tributaries. Organizations and schools apply for Mini Grants to support small-scale restoration projects year round.

In 2008, our Mini Grant Program awarded \$43,071 for 22 restoration efforts statewide. These efforts included on-the-ground projects ranging from rain barrel installation to stream clean-ups in local communities.

Stewardship (Restoration)

The restoration track of the Stewardship Grant Program provides funding to non-profit organizations and local governments for on-the-ground projects that demonstrate important restoration practices.

The Trust awards up to \$35,000 for restoration projects under the Stewardship Grant Program and has an open call for RFP's on a bi-annual basis. Our goal with the Stewardship Program is to engage the public in watershed restoration efforts. In 2008, the Trust provided resources to organizations and groups throughout Maryland for projects including:

 Bioretention cells, rain gardens, rain barrels, and other low impact development storm-water techniques







- Wetland and marsh creation and enhancement
- Shoreline and stream bank enhancement and stabilization
- Installation of agriculture best management practices, including fencing, buffers, wetlands, and more
- · Oyster and fish habitat creation
- · Restoration planning efforts that assess water-

shed characteristics, set a baseline from which progress can be evaluated, and create a framework for and identify future restoration and protection actions

The restoration track of the Stewardship Grant Program awarded \$389,386 to 21 grantees in 2008.

Urban Greening

Urban Greening Grant Program The goal of the Urban Greening Grant Program is to increase the percentage of tree canopy and expand green cover in urban areas. We encourage communities to integrate

trees and natural areas into stormwater management strategies and to connect green spaces in order to maximize long-term community and environmental benefits.

In 2008, the Chesapeake Bay Trust increased funding by 66% to our Urban Greening Grant Program. New program partners included the USDA Forest Service, the Maryland Department of Natural Resources Forest Service Division, and The Home Depot Foundation. The expanded program assisted Maryland communities in implementing "greening" plans that will increase forest canopy, reduce stormwater runoff, improve air quality, and enhance the quality of life in urban areas.

The Trust awarded \$302,000 to 8 local governments and non-profit organizations throughout the state to support this goal.





Education

Environmental education is a cornerstone of the Chesapeake Bay Trust's mission with over 60% of our grantees receiving grants related to environmental education. The Trust seeks to increase environmental stewardship though hands-on education by providing grants that build and expand K-12 environmental education programs and increase student access to meaningful watershed experiences. By investing in education programs, the Trust seeks to build life-long environmental stewards dedicated to the restoration and protection of the Chesapeake Bay.

In 2008, the Trust launched a new grant program – Environmental Education – while continuing to aggressively support education through our highly popular Mini Grant Program. The Trust awarded 267 environmental education grants totaling \$787,312 – the most ever awarded by the Trust to education projects in a single year.

Environmental Education



New in 2008, the Environmental Education Grant Program supported two tracks, Schoolyard Habitats and Expanded Bay and River Education Programs.

Schoolyard Habitats: These grants engage students in large-scale schoolyard habitat projects that help to transform school grounds into living classrooms and laboratories that educate students about local environmental processes and systems and the Chesapeake Bay. Schools receiving Schoolyard Habitats funding had to demonstrate that the project was integrated into classroom curriculum, involved students and the community in its implementation, and served as an active outdoor classroom for use by many students over multiple years.

Expanded Bay and River Education Programs Grants: Engage more teachers and students (K-12) in comprehensive Bay and river education programs within a county school system. The grants provided funding to help school systems, non-profit organizations and/or academic institutions working with school systems, to expand their Bay and river education programs to get more students involved in hands-on bay education experiences.

In 2008, the Trust supported 20 organizations in their efforts to integrate environmental education into their curriculum. Funding totaling \$387,547, engaged thousands of teachers and students.

Mini Grant (Education)



The Chesapeake Bay Trust Mini Grant Program has become an invaluable tool to educators throughout the state. Funding through this program in 2008 helped numerous schools

achieve "Green School" status and engaged over 87,000 students and 8,000 teachers throughout Maryland in environmental literacy projects. Students statewide have had the opportunity to experience the Bay through a field trip, many for the first time, due in large part the the funding made available by the Trust. Tree planting, schoolyard habitat efforts, trash removal, and handson laboratory experiences are just a few of the amazing opportunities made available to students as a result of funding through our Mini Grant Program.

The demand for Mini Grants continues to rise as educators and parents recognize the value of these environmental experiences for their children. 81% of the Mini Grants awarded in 2008 supported educational experiences. \$399,765 was awarded to 267 grantees.

Outreach

Increasing public engagement in the effort to protect the Chesapeake Bay and its tributaries is critical to the long-term health of the environment. Raising public awareness about environmental issues related to the Bay in local communities is an important funding priority for the Chesapeake Bay Trust. Publications, newsletters, websites, and community events are among the types of outreach projects supported by the Trust. The majority of Trust funding comes from contributions through the "Bay Plate" and "Bay Fund Tax Check-Off" programs. These dollars are reinvested in local communities, allowing the Trust to further engage Maryland residents in improving the environmental health of their community.

The Chesapeake Bay Trust's grant portfolio includes two grant programs that support outreach activities. Our Mini Grant Program funds projects below \$5,000 and our Stewardship Grant Program funds projects up to \$15,000. In 2008, 8% of Trust grant funding supported outreach efforts for a total of \$303,186 awarded to 54 organizations.

Stewardship (Outreach)



Through our Stewardship Grant Program, the Trust seeks to increase public awareness and public involvement in the restoration and protection of the Bay and its rivers.

The outreach track of the program was established to provide accessible funds to organizations and agencies for projects that raise public awareness about the environmental challenges and solutions facing the health of the Chesapeake Bay. The Trust awards up to \$15,000 for outreach projects.

The outreach track of the Stewardship Grant Program awarded \$215,594 to 21 grantees in 2008. These projects reached thousands of residents in Maryland through the publication of over 100,000 print materials, websites, workshops and events.





Mini Grant (Outreach)

The Mini Grant Program supports three core objectives of the Trust, restoration, outreach and education. The Mini Grant projects allow community groups, non-profit organizations and schools across the state to fund small-scale projects that promote community engagement and awareness of local environmental issues. Funding from the Trust is a critical resource to local communities, allowing volunteers and community groups to educate their neighbors and encourage increased participation in improving the health of their local rivers and streams.

Of the 301 Mini Grants awarded this fiscal year, \$87,592 supported outreach projects to 33 local organizations.





New ideas and technologies and organizations with the long-term capacity to innovate and affect change are critical to restoring and protecting the Chesapeake Bay. Improving the organizational sustainability of watershed organizations across the Bay watershed was a strategic priority identified by the Trust in the five-year strategic plan adopted in 2005. The Trust also determined that significant grant resources should support new technologies and innovative approaches connected with reducing stormwater and agricultural runoff. These concepts underpin three grant programs that promote innovation and seek to build strong networks of change-agents working to restore the Bay. In 2008, 40% of the Trust's grants, totaling \$1,547,202, were awarded to 35 organizations in support of these goals.

Capacity Building Program



In its second year, the Capacity Building Program is a nationwide model for building longterm, sustainable organizations committed to improving the health of the Bay and the

environment. The program provides grants and technical assistance over a three-year period to selected watershed organizations and Riverkeepers for a suite of activities including leadership training, program development, financial management, strategic planning and technology development. This grant funding and technical assistance is designed to promote clear goals, better program planning, effective program implementation and tracking, and greater stability and efficiency within those organizations. Services provided through the program include targeted operational grants, one-on-one and group trainings, networking, tailored technical assistance and participation in a new watershed network.

The success and impact of the program is evaluated based on the increased capacity of watershed organizations as measured by four core capacity areas shared by all non-profit organizations:

 Adaptive Capacity: the ability of a nonprofit organization to monitor, assess and respond to internal and external changes.

- Leadership Capacity: the ability of all organizational leaders to create and sustain the vision, inspire, model, prioritize, make decisions, provide direction and innovate, all in an effort to achieve the organizational mission.
- Management Capacity: the ability of a nonprofit organization to ensure the effective and efficient use of organizational resources.
- Technical Capacity: the ability of a nonprofit organization to implement all of the key organizational and programmatic functions.

In partnership with the Chesapeake Bay Funders Network (CBFN), the Trust awarded 27 grants in 2008 totaling \$656,975. These grants will serve to increase the operational and programmatic effectiveness of organizations dedicated to the restoration of our waterways.







The Pioneer Grant Program encourages innovative ideas, new technologies, and creative solutions in the realm of stormwater and agriculture best management practices.

The Pioneer Grant Program supports the goals of the Chesapeake Bay 2010 agreement and funds projects and strategies that reduce non-point source pollution in order to improve water quality and restore key living resources in the Chesapeake Bay watershed. In 2008, 3 projects were funded for a total of \$368,612.

Agriculture

In partnership with the Chesapeake Bay Funders Network (CBFN), the Trust launched an agricultural initiative in 2008, seeking to strengthen the economic sustainability of the Chesapeake Bay farming community and improve the health of rivers and streams that feed the Bay by:

 Improving the way excess manure is managed by advancing promising technologies and developing new markets for "waste" products (e.g. highgrade compost).



 Expanding technical assistance and outreach to farmers with innovative approaches that help them efficiently and effectively implement on the ground pollution reduction practices.

Working from the "ground up", the Trust, in conjunction with the CBFN, has pioneered an innovative approach to identifying and supporting strategic partnership projects in key farming communities. Each project includes strong evaluation and com-

munication components that will facilitate transfer of models to other communities and regions. In 2008, this program awarded five grants totaling \$521,615.







Apply for a Grant

The Chesapeake Bay Trust receives thousands of grants each year from organizations throughout the state of Maryland.



Each grant program has specific requirements and a unique application processes. All applicants are encouraged to discuss project ideas and requirements with Trust staff before completing an application. Proposals are evaluated based on the project's potential to meet grant program goals, clarity of project objectives, plans for achieving the objectives and qualifications of the organization that will carry out the activities.

Maryland organizations eligible to be considered for a grant from the Chesapeake Bay include:

- Community Organizations
- County Agencies
- Faith-based Organizations
- · Federal Agencies
- Municipal Agencies

- Non-profit Organizations
- Private Schools
- Public Schools
- State Agencies
- Universities
- Youth Groups

Recipients are held accountable for certifying how grant funds have been spent, submitting a final report documenting grant metrics and deliverables, and verifying grant expenditures.

Endowments, individuals, building campaigns, deficit financing, annual giving and research programs are not eligible for grants. The Trust does not provide grants to support lobbying or activities that advocate political solutions.



Financials

The Trust was founded on the principle that Maryland residents, given the opportunity, would contribute in large numbers to the Chesapeake Bay restoration effort via innovative voluntary, state-sponsored funding mechanisms. This concept launched the "Treasure the Chesapeake" license plate in 1992 and the "Bay Fund" on the Maryland state income tax form in 1989, which together generate the revenues that support the Trust's grant programs. The Trust puts a premium on – and has earned a national reputation for – the accountability, efficiency, and effectiveness of its programming. For the last six years, the Trust has been awarded the highest rating by Charity Navigator, the nation's top independent evaluator of charitable organizations.


Summary for the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 2008

Outreach

Beyond grant programs, the Chesapeake Bay Trust is an active member of the Bay community and engages in multiple efforts throughout the state to encourage participation in the restoration and protection of the Bay.

Awards Program

Each year, the Chesapeake Bay Trust recognizes excellence in our community through our awards program. We honor a volunteer, educator and student who have dedicated extraordinary amounts of time and energy to protecting and preserving the Chesapeake Bay.

In 2008, we celebrated the winners' accomplishments at our annual legislative reception and awards ceremony. Chesapeake Bay Trust Board members Paul Allen and Scot Spencer, along with Allen Hance, the Trust's executive director, announced the winners of the Ellen Fraites Wagner Award, the Honorable Arthur Dorman scholarship and the Teachers of the Year awards to more than 100 legislators, Chesapeake Bay experts and community leaders.

 The Teacher of the Year Award recognizes a Maryland educator who has shown an outstanding commitment to environmental education. Heidi Anthony, a middle school science teacher at Radcliff Creek School in Chestertown, and April Wells, a science teacher at Catoctin High School in Frederick County, were recognized with a \$2,500 award.

- The Arthur Dorman Scholarship is awarded to an outstanding minority student in high school or college who has shown a commitment to improving the environment and exhibits exceptional leadership skills. Jerome Carter, a senior at Mount St. Joseph High School in Baltimore, won the \$5,000 scholarship in 2008.
- The Ellen Fraites Wagner Award recognizes a Maryland citizen who has shown tireless dedication to help preserve and protect the Chesapeake Bay. The Trust was proud to present this \$5,000 award to William Moulden. Ellyn Vail of the Sassafrass River Association was also recognized for her outstanding contributions to the Bay.



Bay Plate Program



One of the easiest ways to help the Chesapeake Bay and support of restoration effort is by purchasing a Bay Plate. The Trea-

sure the Chesapeake license plate is the most popular specialty plate in the state and the largest source of income to the Chesapeake Bay Trust. Revenues generated through the sale of the Bay plate and the associated renewal fee are reinvested in communities throughout the state through the Trust's unique grant programs.

With fully 90% of the Trust's expenditures directed to Chesapeake Bay restoration and education programs, Maryland residents can be confident that their donations are leveraged appropriately. Launched in 1989, the Chesapeake Bay and Endangered Species Fund is one of the most successful tax check-off programs of its kind. These contributions


have funded thousands of projects that have restored many acres of wetlands, planted thousands of trees, and protected numerous species of threatened plants and animals.


